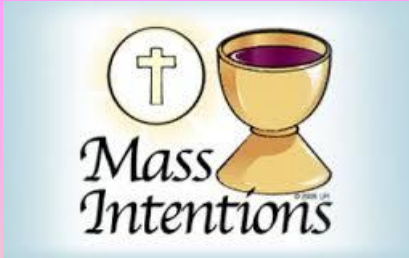

Synopsis: Advent I Sunday (Mt 24: 37-44)

One-page synopsis: Advent I (A) (Nov 27) Homily on Mt 24:37-44:
Introduction: Today we begin our yearly pilgrimage through the

events of our history of salvation starting with the preparation for the birthday celebration of Jesus and ending with the reflection on his glorious “second coming” as judge at the end of the world. We are entering the Advent season. Advent means coming. We are invited to meditate on Jesus’ first coming in history as a baby in Bethlehem, his daily coming into our lives in mystery through the Sacraments, through the Bible and through the worshipping community and finally his Second Coming at the end of the world to reward the just and to punish the wicked. We see the traditional signs of Advent in our Church: violet vestments and hangings, dried flowers on the altar, and the Advent wreath. These signs remind us that we have to prepare for the rebirth of Jesus in our hearts and lives, enabling him to radiate his love, mercy, compassion and forgiveness around us.

Scripture lessons: In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah describes his vision of all nations making a pilgrimage to Jerusalem, affirming their Faith in the one true God. Today’s Responsorial Psalm (Ps 122), is a joyous hymn originally sung as pilgrims journeyed to the Temple in Jerusalem. They prepare us for our yearly pilgrimage.

In the second reading Paul exhorts the Roman Christian community to get ready to meet Jesus in his Second Coming by discharging their duties properly and by freeing themselves from their former pagan tendencies toward excessive drinking, sexual promiscuity, jealousy and rivalry. We, too, are challenged to make spiritual preparations for Christ’s birth in our lives.

In today’s Gospel Jesus warns us of the urgency of vigilant preparation on our part that we may meet him as the judge both at the end of our lives on earth and on the day of the Last Judgment when he

comes in his glory. Jesus reminds us of how the unrepentant and ill-prepared evil people were destroyed by the flood in the time of Noah and how a thief would break in and plunder the precious belongings of an ill-prepared house owner. Using the additional examples later, Jesus repeats his warning for us to be vigilant and well-prepared all the time, doing the will of God by loving others.

Life message: We need to be alert and watchful while spiritually preparing for Christmas by offering our daily work to God for His glory, by practicing more self-control in resisting our evil habits and inclinations, by seeking reconciliation daily with God and our fellow-humans, and by asking God's pardon and forgiveness and extending our unconditional forgiveness to those who have hurt us. Let us begin each day by praying for the strength and power of the Holy Spirit to prepare ourselves for Jesus' rebirth in our hearts and lives.



What is Advent and why do we observe it? The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin words, ad-venio or adventus, which both signify a coming. We believe in three advents of Jesus. The first coming as a baby in Bethlehem, the daily coming through the Holy Bible, sacraments and in praying community and the third coming (known also as Second Coming) in glory to judge the world. We prepare for the celebration of birth of Jesus (Christmas) joyfully by renewing our lives during the four weeks of the Advent season so that Jesus may be reborn in our lives. We do so by repenting of our sins and renouncing our wrong choices. We empty ourselves of the clutter of daily idolatry and renounce the self-love that can so easily squeeze God's grace out of our lives. The Advent wreaths in the church with three purple candles and one rose candle and purple vestments of the priest during the Holy Mass invite us for the renewal of lives. Jesus, reborn in the Christians during Christmas, will

radiate his love, mercy, compassion and spirit of forgiveness and service to the world through his Christian followers. Thus, Advent prepares us, the Christians, for better witnessing of Christ through our lives during the Christmas season.



Pope Francis tweets: “So many women are overwhelmed with the burdens of life and the drama of violence! The Lord wants them to be free and their dignity respected. We have to break out of ourselves to encounter others. If we don’t, even we Christians can suffer from division. May the Holy Spirit help us to be patient when enduring, and to be humble and simple when advising. How much I desire that the years to come will be full of mercy, so that every person can experience the goodness and tenderness of God! We entrust the life of the Church, all humanity, and the entire cosmos to the Lord, asking him to pour out his mercy upon us. If you want a heart full of love, be merciful! It is not enough to experience God’s mercy in one’s life; whoever receives it must also become a sign and instrument for others. We should never forget about beauty, which humanity needs so much! May we make God’s merciful love ever more evident in our world through dialogue, mutual acceptance and fraternal cooperation. I pray that each one may open his heart to this love. Let us be moved by God's watchful gaze. The one thing he desires is for us to abide like living branches in his Son Jesus. Forgiveness is the essence of the love which can understand mistakes and mend them. Christian life is a journey, but not a sorrowful journey; it is joyful.

We come together as a parish family to draw our life from the Eucharist and other sacraments.

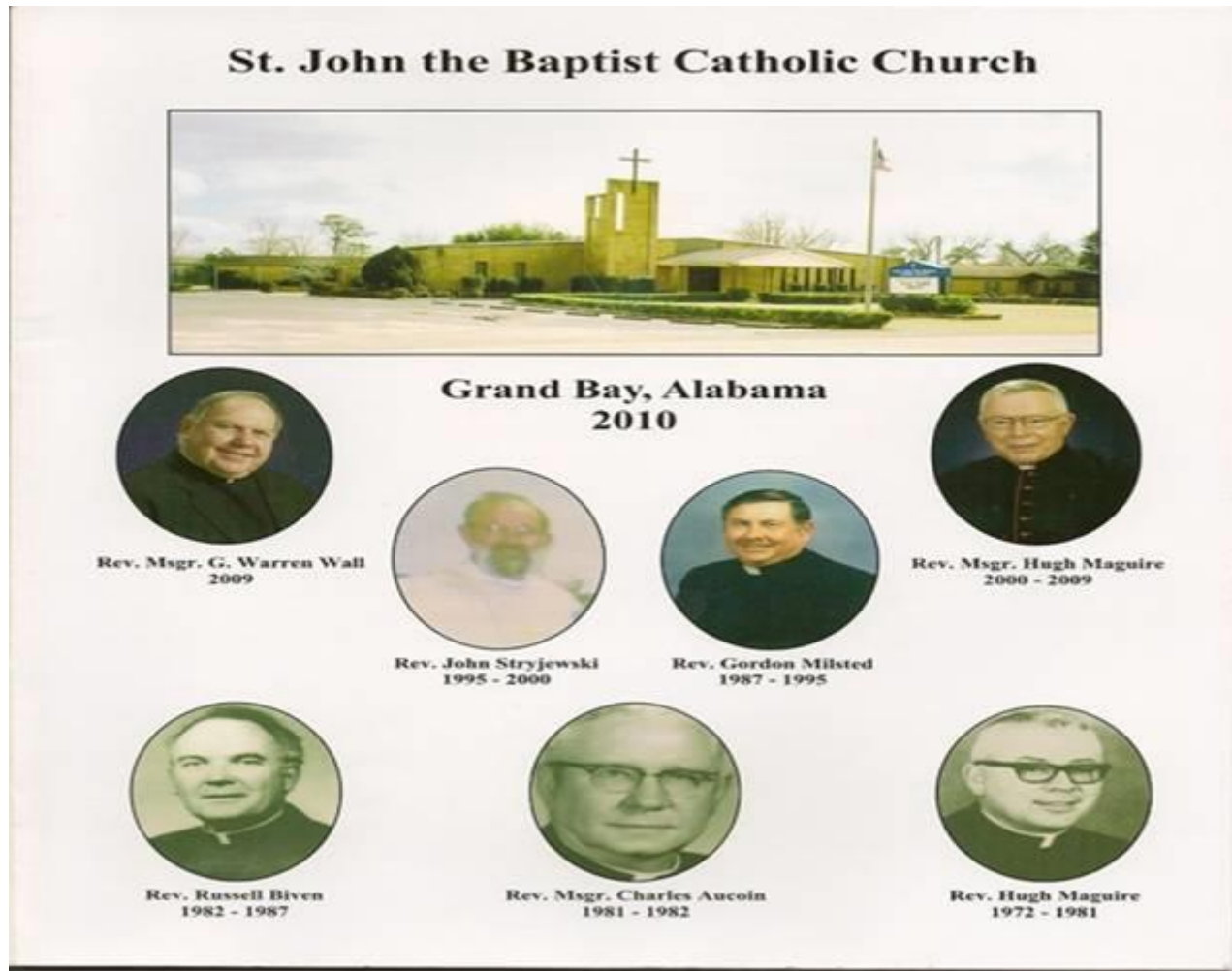
As believers we participate fully, consciously and actively in the liturgy of the Church and seek to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ in word and action.
